
# Tracing Your Family Tree





The Edmonton Public Library has a growing collection of genealogy and local history books, periodicals, maps, electronic resources, and other materials of interest to genealogists. Most of the genealogical collection is housed in the Heritage Room, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, Stanley A. Milner Library, and is designated as noncirculating. This means that materials may be used only in the Library and cannot be checked out. **Our staff cannot do the actual genealogical research for you** but they will help you locate materials in our collection or suggest other possible sources available elsewhere.

The titles listed in this pamphlet represent only a very small part of our collection. To see a comprehensive list of the titles available in the Heritage Room, ask for a copy of *Genealogical Reference Sources at the Edmonton Public Library: a Guide to the Stanley A. Milner Library Collection.* Our genealogy web page at <a href="https://www.epl.ca">www.epl.ca</a> also includes recommended genealogy books and links to many Internet resources.

# **Getting Started**

Genealogical research begins with locating and recording as much information as possible from relatives and family records, such as birth, marriage and death certificates, old Bibles, newspaper clippings, photographs, diaries and letters. As much detail as possible regarding individuals should be collected—full name, the place and date of birth, marriage and death, education, occupation, spouses and children.

The next step involves organizing the information and constructing a pedigree or ancestor chart. In order to verify and expand the chart, it is often necessary to consult original documents, which may be held by various institutions. Some of these are:

# **Records of Births, Marriages** and Deaths

#### Canada

The civic registration of vital statistics in Canada started late in the nineteenth century when it became a provincial responsibility. Local church records are generally the only source of information on births, marriages and deaths before the latter part of the nineteenth century. To locate church records, you will usually need to know the denomination and the parish or mission district.

There is no central repository for church records. You will have to contact a number of institutions. usually the provincial archives, church archives and individual churches. Some of these records are available on microfilm. Some are available only in church archives and others can be consulted only in individual churches. Many church registers have not survived. For sources of church records in Canada, consult Angus Baxter's In Search of Your Canadian Roots.

The National Archives of Canada holds only a small collection of parish registers. Most are transcripts rather than originals and are available on microfilm. They are listed in *Checklist of Parish Registers* 1986 kept at the Information Desk, Stanley A. Milner Library.

The **Family History Library** in Salt Lake City, Utah, holds an extensive collection of microfilm copies of parish registers and vital records from Ontario and Quebec. Microfilms of these records can be obtained through the Edmonton branch of the LDS Family History Centre.

#### **Alberta**

The Province of Alberta keeps civil registrations of births, stillbirths, deaths and marriages. Alberta residents should apply for certificates at their local licensing and registry companies (see License & Registry Services in the Yellow Pages of your telephone book). Copies of certificates issued prior to 1905 when Alberta was part of the Northwest Territories can also be obtained at the Provincial Archives of Alberta.

Persons residing outside of Alberta must send an application for a certificate in writing to Registry Connect, P.O. Box 386, Edmonton, AB T5J 2J6, For more information visit the Alberta Government Services site linked from the library's genealogy subject page.

#### **British Columbia**

The BC Vital Statistics Agency has records of birth, marriage, and death occurring in British Columbia since 1872. An electronic index to historical birth, death and marriage records is available on the BC Archives website (www.bcarchives.gov.bc.ca):

- Birth registrations from 1872—100 years after the date of birth
- Marriage registrations from 1872—75 years after the date of marriage
- Death registrations from 1872—20 years after the date of death

#### Manitoba

Civil registration in Manitoba started in 1882. Manitoba Vital Statistics holds birth, marriage and death records from 1882, together with some incomplete church records prior to that date (searched when the denomination is known).

#### **New Brunswick**

In 1888 a law requiring all churches to report baptisms, marriages and burials came in to effect but was not enforced. Vital records in New Brunswick are complete from 1920 when compulsory registration was enforced. Birth records from 1888 to 1905, marriage and death records from 1888 to 1950, and some incomplete church and civil records prior to 1888 are in the custody of the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick. Some online databases are available on their website. Birth records after 1905 and marriage and death records after 1950 are still in the custody of the Vital Statistics Office.

#### Newfoundland

Civil registration started in 1892. Records from 1892 are in the custody of Vital Statistics.

Incomplete records are available from 1925. Contact the Department of Vital Statistics.

#### **Nova Scotia**

Civil registrations of birth and deaths began in Nova Scotia in 1864 but ceased in 1876. All records for this period are held at the Public Archives of Nova Scotia. Registrations began again on October 1, 1908. Also, some delayed registrations of births were filed after 1908 for individuals born in the province between 1876 and 1908. All records filed after 1908 are held at Nova Scotia Vital Statistics. Marriage records filed at Vital Statistics began from 1906 to 1918 depending on the county where the event occurred. Marriage records prior to these years have been transferred to the Public Archives of Nova Scotia.

#### Nunavut

All births, deaths, adoptions, and marriages that occurred within the territory of Nunavut on or after April 1, 1999, would be registered with Nunavut Vital Statistics. All births, marriages, deaths and adoptions that occurred in the present Nunavut region would have been registered with NWT Vital Statistics.

#### Ontario

Civil registration started on July 1, 1869, but records are complete from 1895. The Office of the Registrar General holds Ontario records for births that happened during the past 95 years, marriages that happened during the past 80 years, and deaths that happened during the past 70 years, and sends vital records annually to the Archives of Ontario. These records are restricted until they have been made available on microfilm. See the Archives of Ontario website for the dates of records currently available (http://www.archives.gov.on.ca).

#### **Prince Edward Island**

Although Prince Edward Island joined the national system of vital statistics in 1920, birth records were kept from 1840 and marriage records from 1886. In 1906 it became mandatory to register births and deaths. Stillbirths were registered from 1920, adoptions from 1930, and divorces from 1946. Baptismal records prior to 1886, death records prior to 1906 and some marriage records 1832 - 1923 have been transferred to the Public Archives and Records Office. Church baptismal records for the 1886 - 1906 period, as well as official birth, marriage and death records post 1906 are kept at Prince Edward Island Vital Statistics.

#### Québec

Civil registration officially began in 1926 but civil registers have been in existence in the Province of Québec since the early seventeenth century. Pre-1900 records are in the custody of the nine regional centres of the Archives nationales du Québec (for addresses visit our genealogy web page and click on Canada—Vital Records—Québec). You will need to provide exact dates and places before the Archives nationales du Québec will issue certificates. Records dating from 1900 can be obtained by contacting le Directeur de l'etat civil (Registrar of Civil Status).

#### Saskatchewan

Registration of marriage started in 1878; registration of births and deaths in 1888. Official civic registration began in 1905, but records between 1905 and 1920 have omissions. Records can be obtained from Saskatchewan Vital Statistics.

#### **Yukon Territories**

Incomplete records date back to 1898 and can be obtained from the Registrar of Vital Statistics.

# **Cemetery Recordings**

More and more searchable cemetery databases, such as the Edmonton Municipal Cemeteries, the British Columbia Cemetery Finding Aid, and the Ontario Cemetery Finding Aid are becoming available on the Internet. Visit our Genealogy web page under Canada—Cemeteries and Obituaries and United States—Cemeteries and Obituaries for links to such websites.

The Archives of Ontario holds the Ontario Genealogical Society's Cemetery Transcriptions, which include transcriptions of the inscriptions on each tombstone and monument as well as additional genealogical information on the deceased. This collection has been microfilmed and is available on microfilm through our interlibrary loan service. The microfilm catalog can be found on the Archives of Ontario website under *Microfilm Interloan Service—Cemetery Transcriptions*.

The Alberta Genealogical Society maintains a computerized MASTER SURNAME INDEX of over 700,000 names collected from Alberta cemeteries and other sources (the major cemeteries in Edmonton and Calgary are NOT included). The Society will do a search for you for a nominal fee. Other genealogical societies have similar indexes. For addresses of genealogical societies in Canada go to our Genealogy web page and click on Canada—Genealogical Societies.

Printed transcriptions from tombstones of certain Alberta cemeteries are available at the Edmonton Public Library. Go to our genealogy web page under *Canada—Cemeteries* and *Obituaries—Alberta* to see the complete list.

## **Obituaries**

The Stanley A. Milner Library has a microfilm collection of the EDMONTON BULLETIN (1880 -1951) and the **EDMONTON JOURNAL** (1903 to present). There is no index to the Edmonton Bulletin. There is a birth, marriages and deaths index for the Edmonton Journal from 1903 to 1909 (see below). The Library also has a card index to obituaries from the Journal from February 1, 1973 to May 8, 1981 but it is arranged by year, month and name. The Edmonton Public Library maintains an obituaries database from the Edmonton Journal from the late 1960s to 1982, located on our homepage under databases. New entries are added yearly—check the database for the most current coverage. Obituaries from May 5, 1981 to December 31, 1992 are indexed by name in our Local History Index (print source). Obituaries from 1989 to November 2002, and February 20, 2004 onward can be searched in our online Canadian Newsstand database. Obituaries from other Canadian newspapers can be obtained through our interlibrary loan service. Please ask for assistance at the Information Desk.

## **Census Returns**

#### Canada

The first Dominion census was taken in 1871. A full census has been taken every ten years since then. Returns prior to 1851 are rarely complete for any geographical area and list only heads of households. Returns after 1851 list every person in the household with age, sex, country or province of birth, marital status, education, religion, and occupation. The 1891 and 1901 censuses note the relationship of each person to the head of the family. The 1891 census

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also lists the birthplace of the parents for each person. The 1901 and 1911 censuses provide the year of immigration to Canada, year of naturalization, and racial or tribal origin.

Original censuses are not arranged by name but rather by enumeration district and sub-district. There are, however, published census records arranged by name and many indexes. Please see the library's genealogy page for details, under Canada—Census Records, and note the various online indexes available. See also selected titles listed below.

#### **Other Countries**

**United States** federal census records from 1790 to 1930 have been digitized and can be searched by name using the Ancestry Library and Heritage Quest databases. Ancestry Library also contains some U.S. state censuses and British census records. More censuses are being added as they become available. Some international census records on microfilm can be obtained through the Edmonton branch of the LDS Family History Centre.

# Passenger and Immigration Lists

#### Canada

The National Archives of Canada holds microfilm copies of the passenger manifests of ships arriving at Canadian ports between 1865 and 1935. These records can be obtained on microfilm through our interlibrary loan service from the National Archives in Ottawa. Records from 1865 to 1919 can also be viewed on microfilm at the Provincial Archives of Alberta.

Many immigrants who came to Canada first landed at a port in the United States. Large numbers came through the major ports of Baltimore, Boston, New York or Philadelphia; others arrived at smaller ports. These records, now at the National Archives of the United States, have been microfilmed and are available through the Family History Centre. Some of these lists have also been published and are in the Edmonton Public Library collection. Border entry records from the United States (1908 - 1935) are also available on microfilm from the National Archives of Canada. The Provincial Archives of Alberta has the years 1908 to 1918. Border crossing records of emigrants from Canada to the United States, 1895 to 1925, are available on microfilm through the Edmonton branch of the Family History Centre.

The Pier 21 Society in Halifax, Nova Scotia, in cooperation with the National Archives of Canada, has input a series of old nominal indexes for the 1925 to 1935 records into a database. This database has names of everyone who arrived by passenger ship at all Canadian ports, not just Pier 21, and is available at www.archives.ca under ArchiviaNet.

#### **United States**

Passenger manifests of vessels arriving at American ports from January 1, 1820 to 1959 are in the custody of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) in Washington, D.C. With only two exceptions (Arrivals at New Orleans, Louisiana, 1813 - 1819 and Arrivals at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, 1800 - 1819), NARA doesn't have passenger records prior to January 1, 1820 because the U.S. Federal Government did not require captains or masters of vessels to present a passenger list to U.S. officials until that date.

From 1892 to 1924 more than 22 million immigrants, passengers, and crew members came to the United States through **Ellis Island** and the Port of New York. Their names can be searched at www.ellisisland.org.

# **Military Records**

Researching military records is a complex task. Detailed personnel records for the Canadian military were not kept prior to the First World War, with the exception of the South African War, and consist mainly of muster rolls and pay lists that contain little or no personal information. Most of the records are not indexed and you need to know the regiment before you can attempt a search. Access to Post-WWI records is governed by the Privacy Act and the Access to Information Act. National Archives of Canada has a large collection of military records. For an overview of holdings and instructions on how to obtain WWI and Post-WWI records, visit the National Archives website at www.archives.ca and select *Military Records*.

For a list of books and other sources in our collection, ask for a copy of Genealogical Reference Sources at the Edmonton Public Library: a Guide to the Stanley A. # **Loyalist Sources**

The United Empire Loyalists were American colonists who supported the British cause during the American Revolution (1775 - 1783). There were no accurate records kept at that time, but it is estimated that some 100,000 Loyalists fled the American colonies. Many of them settled in Canada, drawn by offers of free land.

## **Métis Sources**

The Glenbow Archives in Calgary has an extensive collection of Métis sources for Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, some parts of the Northwest Territories and northern United States. The Archives will do a basic search of its Métis genealogy sources for a fee. Visit the Glenbow Archives website at www.glenbow.org/archhtm/metis.htm for more information.

The National Archives of Canada has a collection of the scrip applications, 1870 - 1901. These applications for scrip include genealogical information about the claimants. Microfilm copies can be obtained through our interlibrary loan service and they are also available at the Provincial Archives of Alberta. A list of microfilm reel numbers by surname can be found on the National Archives of Canada website under *Métis Records*. Applications can also be searched online in the ArchiviaNet database under *Métis Scrip*.

# **Atlases, Maps and Gazetteers**

The Edmonton Public Library has a limited number of historical atlases and gazetteers. However, the University of Alberta maintains an extensive map collection that includes historical maps of European countries, North America and other parts of the world. The collection is now housed on the main floor of the Science and Technology Library (Cameron Building), telephone 492-7912.

## **CD-ROM and Online Sources**

**EDMONTON PUBLIC LIBRARY GENEALOGY WEB PAGE** (www.epl.ca) has links to hundreds of selected genealogy websites to help you find information and records for specific countries or areas (vital statistics records and addresses, census records, passenger and immigration records, military records, archives, genealogical societies, genealogy publishers, etc.) and includes recommended books in our collection.

ANCESTRY LIBRARY DATABASE. Available at all branches. This is one of the largest collections of family history data online. It provides instant access to some 1.2 billion names in more than 3,000 databases of immigration, vital, military, court, church and ethnic records. There are databases dedicated to specific ethnic origins, countries and regions, and local histories. It includes U.S. federal census records between the years 1790 and 1930 with digital images. English and Welsh census records are also available.

HERITAGE QUEST DATABASE. Available at every branch and remotely with a valid library card (Edmonton residents only). The database consists of digital, searchable images of U.S. Federal census records from 1790 to 1930. It contains over 25,000 family and local histories, PERSI (Periodical Source Index), Revolutionary War Pension Applications and Bounty Land Warrant Applications, obituaries, published military and vital records, over 500 U.S. city and business directories. The database is primarily American, but does have some Canadian content.

CD-ROM Heritage Room **CANADIAN GENEALOGY INDEX**, **1600s** - **1900s**. Over two million records referencing individuals from all regions of Canada as well as Alaska, collected from a number of sources, including city directories, birth and marriage records, census records, land records, etc. Also published as a 12-volume set of *Atlantic Canadians*, *1600* - *1900*, *French Canadians*, *1600* - *1900*, *Central* 

Canadians, 1600 - 1900, and Western Canadians, 1600 - 1900, available in our Heritage Room collection.

CD-ROM Heritage Room LAND RECORDS: INDEX TO GRIFFITH'S VALUATION OF IRELAND, 1848-1864. This index lists approximately one million names of Irish property occupants and the county and parish where they resided at the time of the valuation. Some records contain additional information about their occupation, religion, or relative's names. Because no Irish census of the nineteenth century has survived, this index can be used as a census substitute for the years before, during and after the Great Famine.

CD-ROM Heritage Room **RUSSIANS TO AMERICA**, **1850 - 1896**. A collection of passenger list information for approximately 430,000 individuals from Russia, largely those of Jewish heritage, prior to 1896.

CD-ROM Heritage Room **PASSENGER AND IMMIGRATION LISTS: GERMANS TO AMERICA, 1850 - 1888.** Includes individuals coming to America not only from German states or territories but also from countries such as France, Switzerland or Luxembourg.

CD-ROM Heritage Room PASSENGER AND IMMIGRATION LISTS: ITALIANS TO AMERICA, 1880 - 1893. Contains information on approximately 413,000 individuals who immigrated to the United States from Italy. Almost all of the immigrants listed arrived in New York City.

CD-ROM Heritage Room PASSENGER AND IMMIGRATION LISTS: NEW YORK, 1820 - 1850. Contains approximately 1.6 million names of individuals who arrived in New York between January 7, 1820 and December 31, 1850 from various countries, particularly from Ireland, Germany and Italy.

CD-ROM Heritage Room **PASSENGER AND IMMIGRATION LISTS INDEX**, **1538 - 1940**. Includes almost 3 million names of individuals arriving in North America from published sources only.
