2003 at the Edmonton Public Library

The Edmonton Public Library celebrated its 90th birthday in 2003 in style with open houses, exhibitions, contests, a photo retrospective on the web, special editions of *The Source*, recommended book and music lists, and a commemorative poster.

From two libraries with a circulation of 130,000 in 1913 to 16 libraries with a circulation of 8.1 million in 2003, the Edmonton Public Library is well used and loved by Edmontonians of all ages. The Library has experienced tremendous growth in the past five years. The number of visitors has increased by more than 1.2 million, from 4 million in 1999 to 5.2 million in 2003.

Edmonton is a great city for readers and learners. The Library's Centre for Reading and the Arts hosted readings on November 8 by three Edmonton authors who were nominated for Governor General's Awards in 2003. Two days later, it was announced that Vern Thiessen won the Award for Drama and Glen Huser the Award for Children's Literature. Book clubs and discussion groups have blossomed — they have even gone online at the Library.

The Sprucewood branch will be undergoing significant renovations and expansion in 2004, the first for this branch in 45 years. Change, innovation and evolution are a constant for EPL. Our mission, "to connect the people of Edmonton to the knowledge and cultures of the world", is our motivation. Through a multitude of avenues EPL works to reach all Edmontonians from cradle through to the kitchen and boardroom and into retirement. Initiatives such as partnerships with multicultural groups, businesses, outreach programs and the media support and endorse our mission.

Embracing the future, we continue to integrate technology into our services, facilitating and enhancing our collections, services, and programs. Following the initial dramatic increase in the remote use of the new website, the growth in 2003 reflected the ongoing popularity of electronic services such as customer requests, online database, catalogue, and Internet searching. We will continue to explore new technologies to improve service delivery.

We have continued to enjoy tremendous support from all Edmontonians in many ways. Through the efforts of our dedicated fundraising volunteers and donations received, EPL is able to enhance collections, facilities and service. The Lois Hole Library Legacy Program has proven to be an endearing and favourable way for Edmontonians to support their local library and enrich the whole community.

We could not have achieved our historic landmark in the past 90 years without the dedication and hard work of present and past library staff and trustees. We shall continue to deliver excellent library service to all Edmontonians as we prepare to celebrate our city's 100th anniversary in 2004.

ANNUAL REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

Birthday

- To kick off the year-long celebrations, Strathcona branch hosted a 90th birthday open house on March 13, complete with staff from the Library and Fort Edmonton Park in period costumes, music, and refreshments.
- All three issues of the Library's magazine, The Source, were dedicated to looking at the Library's past, present, and future, including comparisons of books children used to read, music that was popular now and in the past, as well as major world and Canadian events in the past 90 years.
- Two exhibitions were held in September in the Stanley A. Milner Library, featuring historical photographs of the Library and the Summer Reading Program.
- In the "90 Books for 90 Years" contest, Edmontonians were asked to nominate their favourite adult and children's fiction books and then vote for the best of the best on the website. Chapters/Indigo and Laurie Greenwood's Volume II Books donated prizes for winners.
- Visitors to the website explored "90 Years in Photos", a celebration of the Library's past.
- Ten past chairs of the Library Board and several hundred guests and customers attended an historic event held in the Stanley A. Milner Library on October 20 to celebrate the Library's 90th anniversary. Open houses were held at all branch locations during Alberta Library Week (October 20 24) when politicians and community leaders joined staff as guest hosts. A commemorative poster was a gift to library visitors.

Reader

- On April 30, Whitemud Crossing branch co-sponsored, with CBC Radio, "Canada Reads Edmonton Authors", to celebrate Canada Book Week and Canada Reads. Featured authors included Tolowa Mollel (The Orphan Boy), Gloria Sawai (A Song for Nettie Johnson, Governor General's Award winner for fiction), Katherine Holubitsky (Alone at Ninety Foot), and Tim Bowling (Darkness and Silence). The program was recorded for broadcast on CBC's Richardson's Round-Up on May 19.
- Canadian authors who read in various branches during Canada Book Week included Wendy McGrath (Recurring Fiction), Guy Gavriel Kay (Beyond This Dark House), Karleen Bradford (With Nothing But Our Courage), and Arthur Slade (Dust), sponsored by the Canada Council for the Arts.
- Stanley A. Milner Library's Centre for Reading and the Arts played host to Edmonton's Lit Fest (October 2 5) to promote the works of Canadian and international authors. Programs included workshops, readings, and discussion panels. Featured reader in the Library was lan McGillis (A Tourist Guide to Glengarry).
- Three Edmonton authors who were nominated for Governor General's Awards in 2003 were hosted by the Centre for Reading and the Arts at a reading held on November 8. Vern Thiessen won the Award for Drama (Einstein's Gift) and Glen Huser for Children's Literature (Stitches). Tim Bowling was nominated in the poetry category (The Witness Ghost).

- Award winner Glen Huser read at the Castle Downs branch and was a guest of the branch at a reading held at the Edmonton Young Offenders' Centre, receiving tremendous response from the audience.
- The largest reading club for children, the Summer Reading Program, titled "Read Up a Storm", was attended by 14,000 children of all ages.

Online

- Children made close to 4,000 visits to the Library's website to participate in its first online-only Winter Reading Program, the first of its kind in Western Canada, that concluded in February.
- In view of the success of the online children's reading club, a winter reading club for adults, "The Big Chill", will be offered in 2004.
- Teens participated in the "Teen Survivor" program online during July. Books were voted off the island, with Dealing with Dragons by Patricia Wrede as the winning survivor.
- The Library celebrated Web Awareness
 Day on February 20 with a workshop
 for adults, "Don't Let Your Children Get
 Caught in the Net". Programs for adults
 and children on how to use the Internet
 safely are offered regularly at various
 branch locations.
- For the fourth consecutive year, the Edmonton Public Library created and hosted the website for the provincial Summer Reading Program. Working with the content provided by and developed with the provincial coordinating library, Yellowhead Regional library, an interactive and appealing website was made available to children in Alberta.

Catalogue

- After several years of planning, the Edmonton Public Library's new computer system, Sirsi's Unicorn, arrived on April 22 at 1 p.m. The automated system is essential to many aspects of library operations, including circulation, customer registration, and cataloguing.
- The hours of public online access to the Library's catalogue dramatically increased, available now 24 hours per day, seven days a week, with the exception of a few night-time hours of downtime per month for maintenance.
- An easy to use, picture-based Kids' catalogue was made available online.
- Thousands of customers signed up to receive notification by email to pick up their holds. This highly anticipated new service is beneficial for both customers and the Library as it expedites turnaround time and further reduces mailing costs.
- Other popular services introduced with the new computer system were the ability to view cover art, reviews and table of contents of many titles in the catalogue and to check their position on the Holds queue before requesting items. Bestseller lists are now displayed and searchable from the catalogue.

Branches

- Circulation of library materials increased by 2.3 per cent to 8.1 million and visits to 16 library locations increased by 5 per cent to more than 5 million.
- Sprucewood branch held a Renovations open house in August to inform the community of its plans for renovations and expansion. Construction will be underway in early 2004.
- Plans are being made to renovate and expand the Strathcona branch, a heritage building and a registered historical resource in Alberta.

Grow

- The Lois Hole Library Legacy Program, launched on March 4, planted seeds to grow library collections. Available year-round, this program encourages Edmontonians to make financial donations to honour special occasions such as birthdays, graduations, anniversaries or retirements. With the growing season peaking in spring and winter, the program raised \$116,000 to enrich library collections.
- The Hon. Lois E. Hole donated her portrait, painted by Izabella Orzelski-Konikowski and Bogdan Koral-Konikowski, to the Library to increase awareness of the Lois Hole Library Legacy Program. The portrait, unveiled during the media event to kick off anniversary open houses, became a permanent exhibit in the Stanley A. Milner Library.
- Due to the efforts of more than 200 fundraising volunteers, the Library had the most financially successful year for book sales in 2003, with \$81,500 raised from the three major sales: spring, Fringe and fall.
- An increasing number of supporters made donations online from the Library's website at <u>www.epl.ca/donate</u>
- The Library was one of the beneficiaries and organizers of Raise a Reader, a project of The Edmonton Journal and Global Television, designed to raise awareness of the importance of literacy and raise funds for family and children's literacy. Funds donated to the Library were used to buy books for children's literacy.
- The Anti-Poverty Round Table
 Committee of the Mill Woods
 Presidents' Council, representing all
 community leagues in the area, made a
 donation of close to \$10,000 to the Mill
 Woods branch to purchase five new
 computers and four desks.

- The Library and the Banzai

- Television weather specialists, A-Channel's Dawn Chubai, CFRN-TV's Ian Leonard, and Global Television's Claire Martin, helped promote the Summer Reading Program, "Read Up A Storm", by posing for a promotional poster and the cover of *The Source*.
- The Library's S.W.A.T. Team (Stories With A Twist) conquered Attack of the Killer Fringe in August. Inspired by the theme of the Summer Reading Program, staff from eight branches performed to hundreds of Fringe Festival attendees, while family, friends, and other staff contributed to set, costume design, and props.
- Ninety-six Dewey Decimators represented the Library in its first attempt at the Corporate Challenge when they raced, walked, pulled, ate (chicken wings), scavenger hunted, cheered and played to a 21st place finish. Director Linda Cook placed third in the CEO challenge.
- Using humour and drama, the Library started an advertising and promotional campaign, "Ask Us", in the fall to promote reference services that customers can use on location, by phone, and online. The campaign will continue in 2004.
- To welcome CBC as a neighbour in the city center, library staff and trustees donated over \$1,000 and two birds (equivalent to 53 turkeys) to CBC Radio's annual turkey drive in support of the Edmonton Food Bank.

Library staff Therese Gavigan "hawked" newspapers to raise funds for the "Raise a Reader" program, of which the Library was one of the beneficiaries.

Diversity

- The First Annual Cultural Diversity Day, initiated by Canadian Heritage, was celebrated in the Stanley A. Milner Library on June 26 with a concert performed by the Alberta Chinese Orchestra, refreshments catered by Changing Together, an organization that works with new immigrants, and a display of selected writings by immigrants of their experiences.
- In partnership with Family Productions Inc., the Library launched the Multicultural and Business Centre in the Edmonton Woman's Fall Show (October 18 & 19) to promote the Library as a source of information for business and families as well as a resource for new Canadians.

Literacy

- The Library presented "Harmony in Words" on October 6 as one of the READ IN literacy campaign programs. Local musicians Gilbert Anderson and Kathleen Steinhauer Anderson performed Métis music from the Fort Edmonton era along with storytellers. Linda Goyette, the Library's Writer-in-Residence, produced the show with assistance from Carolina Roemmich. They are writers and researchers for the Edmonton: A City Called Home project to celebrate the City's centennial in 2004.
- Marlene Smith (wife of Mayor Bill Smith) and her grandson paid a visit to "Paws for a Story" in the Whitemud Crossing branch during READ IN week. Co-sponsored by the Library and the Pet Therapy Society of Northern Alberta, the program used therapy dogs and their handlers to help children improve their literacy skills.
- The Library and the Edmonton Community Adult Learning Association presented a Readers' Theatre at the Mill Woods branch during READ IN week.
